Friendship comes in all sizes

Bev is big, really big. She doesn't feel like she belongs until she meets a tiny new friend.

You will need:

- Templates provided
- Crayons or coloured pencils
- Scissors
- Glue or sticky tape
- Cereal or tissue box and a cardboard roll

Key words: massive, gigantic, humongous, and ginormous.

What to do:

Use coloured pencils or crayons to decorate the template, look at the images of the book and notice Bev's brown spots, and Kev's black wings.

- Demonstrate how to use the scissors. Support by allowing the child to try for themselves but assist where they need. Cut along the dotted lines.
- Fold along the light grey lines.
- Wrap Bev's spotted body around a cardboard roll to strengthen.
- Cut 4 legs out of cardboard use an empty tissue box or cereal box, tape each leg to Bev's body. Add the tail to one end of the body.
- Secure Bev's head to her concertina (folded) neck use sticky tape and secure to body.
- Fold Kev in half glue or tape together.
- Use Bev and Kev puppets to retell the story, talk about feelings and emotions and all the ways we can be kind friends.
- Language extension: look for large things in your everyday life such as trees or buildings. Use words from the story like huge, ginormous, or massive when talking about them.


Key Message:
